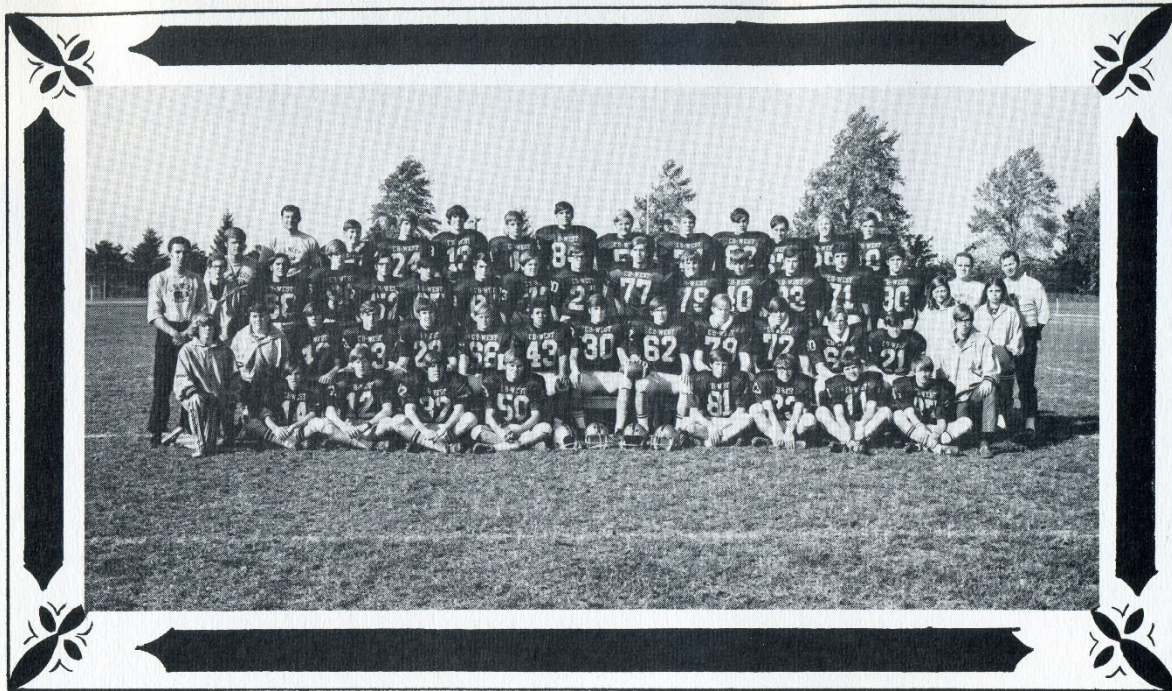

**1971 Central Bucks West
Bux-Mont Championship Football Team
Wins 10 Losses 0**

Prior to the 1971 season opener, Coach Pettine stated, "For the first time since the split we have depth ... two and three deep in some positions – extremely deep in the backfield."

Game One: Central Bucks West -- 20 Council Rock -- 8

They totaled only 39 yards rushing but junior Quarterback Pat Carey completed five of six passes for 59 yards to Jeff Stempel. It was 8 pts for Council Rock at the end of first half. The Bucks kicked off in the second half with an 80-yard march to their first TD. Tom Duff plunged for the next score in the fourth with 8:20 left. With 5:31 remaining, Max Guydon's 5-yard run and Pat Carey's pass to Steve Weber brought their opening win.

Game Two: Central Bucks West -- 43 Quakertown -- 18

The Bucks scored in every quarter. Some impressive Stats: First Downs: 21 vs 16; Yards Gained Passing: 115 vs 61; Total Net Yardage: 385 vs 269. Steve Jensen's first catch of the year on a 58-yard run and 27-yard perfect toss from Pat Carey with 9:59 in third period. Game marked five consecutive series of scoring plays for West.

Game Three: Central Bucks West -- 26 Souderton -- 22

Bucks Stun Indians ~ "What a comeback!" said Coach Pettine back in the locker room. The Bucks were down 22-12 with seven minutes to play. Two minutes and four seconds later Ray Rodemer scampered 21 yards. Score! Jeff Stempel caught three passes for 52 yards and Tom Duff charged for 41; Max Guydon for 8; then Tom Duff slammed over for the final yards.

Game Four: Central Bucks West -- 56 Perkiomen Valley -- 0

It was 30-0 at halftime. Bucks penalties totaled 90 yd; yet the Total Net Yardage was 486 vs 70. In the second half, Max Guydon and Tom Duff raised the score to 42. Coach Pettine gave the underclassmen a chance to play: Dusty Bryan and Craig Schillo brought in the final two TDs.

Game Five: Central Bucks West -- 38 Wissahickon -- 22

Three minutes in, Guydon scored from the two-yard line after a 65-yard, eight play drive. Pat Carey's 114 yards brought one TD; The ground game brought Net Yardages of 116 for Max Guydon; 96 for Tom Duff; and Ray Rodemer 13. Jeff Stempel's *sticky fingers* reached out for 3 passes from Pat Carey. Coach Pettine praised his Lineman for their "handling" of Wissahickon in all phases of the game.

Game Six: Central Bucks West -- 20 Hatboro Horsham -- 16

Considered the Bux-Mont Super Bowl! The 'Double Wham' Does it! Carey~Stempel~Rodemer
Beyond this perfect Football season, it was the sixth game played at home against Hatboro Horsham that became one for the record books because of a "stopped clock."

Excerpts from Intelligencer staff reporter Jim Sneddon:

"The clock showed 41 seconds remaining. On the next play Max Guydon was thrown for a one-yard loss. Hatter followers say the play, which took at least 10 seconds to execute, was run without benefit of the clock.

"Four plays later, West won the game on a pass from Pat Carey to Jeff Stempel on a play that began with six seconds showing—a play that would have never taken place, says (Hatters' Coach) Frassenei".

There have been news headlines where clocks were stopped at football games because altercations had occurred on and off the field, but the CBW-Hatboro Horsham is game that may have been a First where at the close of the game, tempers ran so high, altercations came close to happening after the teams left the field.

Game Seven: Central Bucks West -- 16 Pennridge -- 12

Max Guydon was held to 64 yards in 17 carries; but “ ... there was no stopping him after he all but stepped into the end zone while fielding the second half kickoff.” Two-point conversions to Jeff Stempel and the second TD by Guydon kept Pennridge from a win, even though the Rams racked up 259 Net Yards as compared to the Bucks’ 166.

Game Eight: Central Bucks West -- 36 Upper Perkiomen -- 0

Three TDs were scored by Max Guydon’s runs of 22, 38 and 63 yards. Pat Carey spread his passing around: Steve Jensen, Max Guydon and Jeff Stempel.

Game Nine: Central Bucks West -- 26 North Penn -- 0

By the time half time rolled around, Jeff Stempel had caught a Pat Carey pass and Steve Jensen picked off NP’s toss, running for a second TD. In the second half, Pat Carey threw to Jeff Stempel for an 8-yard TD, and another for 49 yards to Steve Jensen—his tenth of the season.

Game Ten: The HEADLINE ~ *West Buries East for Bux-Mont Crown 48-6*

The 1971 close of the Football Season brings the Undefeated CB West (W-9; L-0) against CB East (W-3; L-9). Doylestown Football History reaches back to the 1930s for a Bux-Mont Championship team; and recently another Championship in 1967.

CB West scored in each quarter: It was a running game to end the season!

The team’s Net Yard Gain was 352 yards. Tom Duff and Max Guydon each carried for three TDs; and Ray Rodemer for two TDs.

Outstanding Individual and Team Efforts of the 1971 Season

Winners of the Bux-Mont Championship with an Undefeated 10 - 0 Record.

Tom Duff, Max Guydon and Jeff Stempel nominated for the Big 33 Team.

The CB West Team ended the Season in Third Place in the Philadelphia Inquirer Team Standings.

Max Guydon was selected on the Specialty Team by the Inquirer's All-Area Football Selections.

Max Guydon and Tom Duff finished First and Second in the Daily Intelligencer's Bux-Mont Scoring Title with 96 and 88 points respectively. Pat Carey captured the Passing Crown.

The Philadelphia Bulletin's All-Suburban Football Teams chose the following:

Jeff Stempel - First Team Offense

Max Guydon – Second Team Offense

Honorable Mention: Tom Duff, Steve Jensen, Pat Carey, Ed Morris

Max Guydon and Tom Duff ended their three-year careers with the following totals:

Duff ~ Net Yards: 2,119 for 5.4 yard average

Guydon ~ Net Yards: 1,634 for 6.1 yard average

Pat Carey threw 13 Touchdown Passes during the Season, completing at least 1 in each of the 10 games played.

Jeff Stempel set new pass receiving records for both total number of catches and total yards, breaking Bill Tesno's 1970 records.

Although Steve Jensen caught but 5 passes, each was for a Touchdown. Steve also had a 51.2 yards per catch average.

Max Guydon's 99 yd. kickoff return for the Winning Touchdown against Penridge.

Coach Pettine was selected as Coach of the Year by Philadelphia Inquirer 1971
